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An introduction to Ysgol yr Esgob.....

We are a rural, Church Aided School in the heart of the active and friendly community of Caerwys, situated between the Clwydian Mountains and the coast of North Wales. Our values are at the heart of everything we do. We believe that children should feel what it is like to succeed; that they should grow as well rounded individuals. We aim to achieve happy, relaxed learners, who get a great deal of enjoyment out of what they do. They learn the importance of self-improvement and take responsibility for their own learning. Our pupils are nurtured and in turn they learn to respect each other and those who nurture them. Our older children leave with knowledge of how to be supportive, kind and caring, and how important it is to give to their community. Excellent relationships exist between staff and children and our nurturing environment creates a vibrant, happy and inclusive atmosphere that many visitors comment upon.

When visiting our school, many people ask about what it is like teaching mixed age classes. The art to this is making sure that different levels of work are set so that there is the correct amount of challenge and support. In doing so we consider the stage children are at rather than their age; older children often support younger ones in their learning and younger children learn a great deal from watching their peers. We are also lucky to have classroom assistants in every class who work alongside our highly skilled teachers, helping to deliver lessons to children at different levels. As a Church in Wales VA School, the Governing Body is required to have a majority of Foundation Governors and this must be reflected in the composition of the committees. Foundation Governors are nominated by the Mission Area and approved by the Diocesan Education Department at St. Asaph.

The Parent Governor is elected by parents for a term of four years. To be eligible a prospective Parent Governor must be a parent or guardian of a child at the school at the time of the election. Once appointed, the Parent Governor may continue in office for the full four year term even if their child leaves before the four years expires. At present there are no vacancies.

Governors have met twice every term to monitor the activities of the school. The Head teacher presents a report at the second meeting of each term. Members of the Governing Body are frequent visitors to the school throughout the term and are kept fully informed. The minutes of governors' meetings are available at school for any parent or interested party to view.

This is what we focussed on in 2022-23

Management of Systems and Processes

 To ensure that procedures and systems in school work effectively and impact on learning

Learning and teaching

- To continue to develop provision in line with the new Additional Learning Needs Bill and to ensure that this impacts on wellbeing of pupils and their progress
- Develop teacher understanding of Religion, Values and ethics education and therefore pupil understanding of the context, why and what they are learning

Working with our Community

- For parents and governors to understand important elements of the CfW and to experience them first hand so they can support pupils
- .

Our School Building

 To redo the covered area at the back of the school and to refurbish the conservatory that house the school library

Three committees run in the first half of every term. They are Finance and Staffing, the Wellbeing Committee and the Curriculum and Assessment Committee. Any recommendations by these committees are then fed back into Full Governing Body meetings in the second half of every term.

The progress we made against our plan in 2021/22.

Management of Systems and Processes.

- Sue Clisham provided training and Stacey Jones completed BPVS, Ravens and Nara tests for pupils in her class who have ALN. This was fed into ALN plans. This needs to continue to support Emma O'Neill in her new role.
- Ellen Devitt attended a Holywell Consortium Welsh meeting and also Athrowen Bro visited on a number of occasions. As a result, Ellen is now developing an overview of Welsh Language needs at Lixwm and is learning what she needs to do to co-ordinate this part of the curriculum.
- Headsprout intervention impacted well on Year 2 pupils.
- Precision teaching techniques have been used effectively. Precision teaching techniques were also used as part of the Safmeds maths intervention.
- The Rill reading intervention did not go ahead. There was a problem with data protection and this was not resolved until the summer term 23. Also, staff felt that there wasn't the capacity in school at the present time to carry out the time heavy intervention.

Working with the community

- Governors have visited school to judge competitions, attend Eisteddfod, attend Church Services, to help
 organise the wrap around provision and the adjacent building, to support the headteacher regarding
 redundancy and finance, to help with appointments, to support the headteacher with ALN matters, and to
 appoint the interim headteacher (current head on secondment with GwE)
- The leaflet promoting the School's Curriculum Offer to parents was sent out in the Summer Term. There wasn't a meeting held specifically to discuss the Curriculum for Wales. However, there were meeting held for Mathematics and also Relationships and Sexuality Education.
- Reading will be moved forward into future SDP work as it warrants more of a focus in terms of parental involvement.
- Each school has asked support of its community –Ysgol Lixwm has engaged with local businesses such as the Quarry and Farm Shop and Y4/5/6 pupils have been on visits.

Learning and Teaching

- Teaching staff spent 4 staff meetings considering a PowerPoint about attachment sent over by Jan Taylor, Educational Psychologist as the result of a consultation request from Lixwm school. However, both schools benefitted. These sessions were excellent CPD for staff who were able to share experiences. It is developing empathy, tolerance and understanding in both settings as well as developing strategies to help in the classroom.
- Staff attended training on the literacy intervention, Headsprout.
- Ali Spooner and Kath Allen from Lixwm along with Emma Jones from Caerwys went on Rill Training. This is
 run by Bangor University. It is a research project. Pupils have done screening tests and those taking part in
 the project have been identified.
- Jan 10th Inset Day was used to deliver information to all staff, teachers and TAs about the new ALN Bill. They considered what Universal Provision looks like in our classrooms and what it should look like also. They considered the roles of the class teacher and teaching assistant as well. As a result, all staff now have an understanding of Universal Provision and what they should be doing as professionals.
- In the afternoon, all staff did Precision Teaching training. They worked through a number of modules and as a result, precision teaching techniques are now being used for ALN pupils in both schools. This is a pilot intervention for the Local Authority brought in to support pupils with dyslexia. However, formal training on Dyslexia still needs to be sources and planned in.

- Fay Booth organised a considerable number of extra transition sessions for Year 6 pupils, with the support of
 Inclusion Outreach. All year 6 pupils left our school in a positive manner, ready for their move to high school.
 The self esteem and confidence of one of our Year 6 pupil was such that she was able to attend the Cardiff
 residential and enjoyed the visit. This was a tremendous success. All the hard work here has made a great
 deal of difference.
- Outside Agencies involved: Speech and Language, Nurture Support (former Behaviour Support) Planted Adults Project (Speech and Lang), CAMHS, Hearing, Educational Psychologist, CLASS.
- Dana Price Jones from CLASS did training with teachers in both schools taking a case study from Lixwm. This improved understanding of what a specific literacy difficult looks like as opposed to a language difficulty. This tied in well with the work we are doing on precision teaching and how this helps with memory for whole words.
- Talkboost techniques have been built into the provision and assessments have identified needs in the 3-8 class. The Planted Adults Project has helped to integrate these ideas as the specialist TA has been into school three mornings a week working alongside staff.
- SC worked with all pupils at Ysgol Licswm to produce a school prayer. The following was considered:
- Why do we pray? What do we do when we pray what questions do we ask? What is generally covered?
 What do you think we should pray about? What is most important. Pupils produced lots of very good ideas.
 The thinking was deep good evidence of the produce of strong Church School ethos. A few pupils came up with "traditional" type Church language.
- Staff did the RVE deep dive over three staff meetings in the Spring Term. We have a much better understanding of what we need to include in our topics.
- Pilgrimage
- Rights of the Child (staff felt that Jigsaw covers this well)
- Links with Eco-School and Christian Stewardship
- Links with awe and wonder during Forest Schools
- Religious stories about local places St. Winifred's Well and also St. Asaph Cathedral visit
- Inequality and injustice Fair Trade and also Black History Month (Staff discuss the text Journey to Jo'Burg by Beverely Nadoo)
- Need to look at other Faiths and visit places of worship for other faiths
- Need to link to a school in another country
- Look at the role of local leaders in the community and also local Government
- Need to look at the Parables
- Develop a sense of Cynefin and a sense of belonging to our local communities.
- Staff decided that Jigsaw R.E. was not for them and made the decision to deal with RVE in a cross curricular manner next academic year.
- School Prayers are now in place for both schools.

Most staff have trialled Understanding Christianity Units. This was reviewed in a staff meeting – they felt that
these units were very complicated and not particularly helpful to teachers in terms of planning. They were
almost too involved. However, the unity around Christmas and Easter were judged to be useful to provide a
whole school approach to learning during these times and will be adopted by staff in both schools.

Classroom Practice

After all the disruption from the Covid Pandemic, staff took time to reflect on their classroom practice, what needs to be changed and how as a school we can move back to our more "normal" cycle of self-evaluation. Also, two members of our staff joined our school shortly before the Pandemic and it was therefore necessary to work on whole school practice.

The particular focus this year was Literacy, Language and Communication planning, revising our whole school approach that was so strong prior to the Pandemic. Teachers considered how they plan lessons for writing in series, how they balance text, sentence and word level needs, and specifically considered how they meet the different needs of all in their class. This resulted in a reinforced whole school approach to planning in LLC and how then this fits into

our topic work. We also revisited whole school marking expectations and the fact that we need to plan for two different types of writing every term at least.

Our Curriculum Offer

One of our priorities is to continue to develop our curriculum at Ysgol yr Esgob. In 2022-23, teachers spent time examining the new Areas of Learning and Experience (AOLEs) within the Curriculum for Wales. They did a particularly "deep dive" into the Health and Wellbeing AOLE as this was new but they also considered all other areas (Literacy, Language and Communication, Maths and Numeracy, Science and Technology, Humanities and Expressive Arts). Staff from both Ysgol yr Esgob and Ysgol Lixwm worked together to consider their curriculum vision and their "nonnegotiables". As a result, both schools produced a two year rolling programme of topics we are going to offer. We also identified French as the preferred Modern Foreign Language and set up a new planning and assessment tool called Taith 360.

Maths and Numeracy

The main focus here was to work on planning for numeracy across the curriculum. Our Maths Advisor, Ann Jones came into school over two inset days and helped staff to plan for numeracy across the curriculum within the topics identified as part of our curriculum offer.

Our School Building

Our new building was finally commissioned in April 2022. Clwb Bwthyn Bach, our day care/after school care provider, had been previously running in our school hall. As you could imagine, this was quite disruptive, but necessary. Having the new building has meant that we now have full use of our hall again. It isn't all about space though! Our younger pupils now have a tailor made unit waiting for them when they move over at 11.30am. Also, we have somewhere to house after school club. Other community groups are interested in renting the building. It is a huge asset to our school.

Working with our Community

Three governor committees were established within the new Bryniau Clwyd Federation of Schools and these are up and running and working well. They were run online during 2021-2022. The Federation now has a new logo and a the school is organising the production of a new website. Teachers at both schools continue to plan closely and organise visits or curriculum "hooks" together. The main impact of working together can be see in our curriculum development.

We are a highly inclusive school.......

Our Mission Statement "Respect, Respond, Be brave, Rejoice!" underpins our feelings about inclusion at Ysgol Yr Esgob. The Governors are kept informed by means of regular Head's reports and by having a Governor, Mrs. Gwen Jones, with a designated responsibility. Parents are made aware of targets set for pupils and are informed of progress and developments. The school has an Additional Needs Policy available for inspection at the school upon request. We have well established links with a wide variety of agencies who support the learning of pupils with additional needs and they make very good progress. Outside agencies including Speech Therapy, Educational Psychology, Occupational Therapy, Sensory Support and Inclusion Outreach. School makes very good use of this support and is proactive in providing pupils with what they need. Mrs Fay Booth is the designated ALN Coordinator.

One of our strengths is the way we provide work at different levels for all pupils in order to support them appropriately. Our local High School also offers support for more able pupils and we send pupils over to take part in events. There is access to all areas of the main school for children with disabilities. There is open access to the curriculum and all extra-curricular activities for all pupils regardless of ability. The school has a designated disabled parking bay for ease of access. School also provides support for a member of our community who has Down Syndrome. She is a regular visitor to our Y4/5/6 classroom.

Any incidents in school around race, sexual orientation and bullying should be reported to the Governing Body for consideration. There were none reported in 2021-2022

What we offer our pupils - Our Curriculum

At the heart of the curriculum at Ysgol yr Esgob are four core purposes.









They underpin all aspects of our curriculum design, planning and teaching. Our vision and values as a school support the four purposes and our learning experiences and teaching methods will always aim to do so.

Our curriculum is structured into six areas of

learning and experience.



All teachers use a scheme of work called Jigsaw to deliver the main part of the Health and Wellbeing area.





All teachers deliver an English Language and a Mathematics lesson at least four times a week Our pupils are taught to look after their physical health through weekly lessons with sports coaches.

The other areas of learning and experience along with the application of English and Maths are delivered by cross curricular topics.



We also enrich our curriculum with high quality authentic learning experiences, visits out, residential visits and a wide range of visitors who help to make learning real and exciting.

The school offers a broad and balanced curriculum based on first hand practical experience. Our children thoroughly enjoy their time here and leave school with many happy memories. We provide them with experiences that are relevant and that support their learning. We nurture our children, closely considering their wellbeing as well as providing them with just the correct level of challenge.



We deliver our Health and Wellbeing curriculum using a scheme of work called Jigsaw. The Jigsaw Programme has been used in our school since May 2021.

Jigsaw has two main aims for all children:

- To build their capacity for learning
- To equip them for life.

Jigsaw brings together Personal and Social Education, safety, Relationships and Sexuality Education, emotional literacy, mindfulness, social skills and spiritual development. It is designed to support a whole school approach, with all year groups working on the same theme (Puzzle) at the same time at their own stage of learning

During their journey, pupils experience certain residential visits. Older children benefitted from a residential visit to Cardiff in July 2022. They visited the Senedd and had a debate in one of the chambers. They also spent some time in Cardiff Bay, experienced a boat tour, visited Cardiff Castle and the Principality Stadium. "Down time" included a bowling night and also a film night at the centre, and on the way home they went to The Big Pit. We go to Cardiff every year with children from other small schools and this helps with their transition as they are mixing with pupils who will be attending the same schools. Our Year 3 pupils had a one night stay at Colomendy, near Mold, and our Year 4 and 5 pupils enjoyed their two night stay at the Plas Menai Centre, near Caernarfon.

Mrs. Booth and Mrs. Dunn are both qualified Forest Schools practitioners and our children gain a great deal from using our school garden in this way. We are also very lucky to have a trained music specialist as our Head teacher, Mrs. Clisham and also Mrs. Burke Williams is a performing arts specialist. Both Mrs. Clisham and Mrs. Burke Williams take weekly singing sessions and they encourage expressive arts of all kinds. Our annual Christmas production allows children to use their performance skills to a very high standard indeed! Music lessons are offered to pupils and as many as possible are encouraged to take up a musical instrument.

We also offer a range of after school clubs including Sports Multi-skills, Performing Arts and a craft club.

Our Sporting Achievements_We use "Dragon Sports" to cover P.E. lessons for all children across the school every week. This allows the Head teacher to release all teachers for their PPA time (statutory Planning, Preparation and Assessment time that all teachers have to have). Dragon Sports employ highly trained, expert coaches. This means our children get a great sporting diet. Pupils have attended a number of competitions this year including Dodgeball, Girls Football. Pupils have also had playleader sessions and a Boccia session. We are developing strong links with local sports clubs. Children receive swimming lessons at Holywell Leisure Centre during the Spring Term and we have annual involvement from Holywell Cricket Club, where a number of our pupils attend. Also, Caerwys Football Club lease our school field for their training and matches. During the Summer term, we hold an annual Sports afternoon which is very enjoyable.

Philosophy for Children training for Mrs. Burke Williams and resulting sessions for Year 4, 5 and 6.

The Queen's Jubilee Picnic Lunch and also our Parade around Caerwys

The Aura Obstacle Course, run by Dragon Sports as a reward for excellent behaviour during sports lessons

Health and wellbeing has been and will continue to be a strength and one of our most essential foundation stones for learning.

Our Christian values are very important to us as they govern how we all behave.

We think creativity essential as it allows our pupils to grow and flourish at their individual levels. It helps to inspire confidence in our pupils and the ability to take risks in their learning.

We promote the Welsh Language and also our pupils sense of belonging to Wales. By encouraging this they develop a sense of self and a sense of who they are and where they come from.

Our curriculum is broad and balanced and it inspires our pupils.

Collaboration is very important to all at Ysgol yr Esgob. We are an excellent team and we act as role models for our pupils. We expect our pupils to collaborate with each other and see this as an essential tool for their future roles.

Community Links

The school maintains strong links with the local community. In 2021-22, things began to return to normal and it was with great relief that our pupils were able to begin to get out and about again. The usual termly services resumed at St. Michael's Church, with our Easter Service followed by our Leavers Service in July. When we were unable to invite an audience, the school continued to offer opportunities to perform for pupils and these were recorded or live streamed to a parental audience.

We celebrate St. David's Day with an Eisteddfod in school which parents are encouraged to attend. In July we held a Summer Fair on the school site in conjunction with the Church, which was very successful. Finally, throughout the year, the school regularly contributes articles and pictures for the Caerwys Chronicle. The PTA was formed in 2016 on the initiative of a number of governors who are parents. Events organised include raffles at the Christmas shows, and the Summer/Christmas Fair, jointly organised with St. Michael's Church. Money raised helps to subsidise transport for educational visits, to purchase ICT equipment, and also to pay for special events for the children.

The Governing body wishes to express its thanks to the dedicated core of the PTA who do so much on behalf of the school. All parents are more than welcome to attend meetings and contribute to the organisation and running of these events.

Welsh Language at Ysgol yr Esgob

Our pupils use the Cymraeg Campus initiative to encourage Welsh Language throughout the school and we are working hard to re-establish standards in Welsh language after the pandemic. We already have our Bronze Award and are working towards our Silver. Highlights for 2021 2022 include our annual Eisteddfod and a visiting theatre group "Tales from Wales". We follow a structure of language patterns called, "Cymraeg ar dy dafod" and these are displayed and referred to in every class. All pupils hold a Helpwr Heddiw (Today's helper) session using Welsh Lanugage. Pupils are awarded tocyn iaith by Criw Cymraeg for their efforts to use Welsh. We



have weekly lessons but we also encourage children to speak as much Welsh as possible outside the lesson. The content of our topics help to develop knowledge of the "Welshness" of Wales. Year 6 children attended an annual residential visit to Cardiff along with others from local schools. They experienced what our capital city has to offer and stayed at the Urdd Building on Cardiff Bay. There was plenty of opportunity to practice Welsh language skills as the staff at the Urdd constantly encourage this.

In 2022-23 A new conservatory replaced the library area and the glass covered area was renewed at the back of the school

Our Results and Attendance Data

The Relaxation of School Reporting Requirements (Wales) (Coronavirus) Regulations 2022 stated that schools across Wales do not need to report results or attendance data to parents in order to ease the administrative burdens on schools and governing bodies at this time.

Holidays in School time

Parents are reminded NOT to take holidays in school term time as this effects learning. Governors politely remind parents that it is a legal requirement for children to be in school from the age of 5. We need to bring our children up with the correct values, ready for the workplace. If a child has a cold, please still bring them in. If a child needs antibiotics prescribed by a doctor, school will help parents/carers by administering these in the middle of the day as long as the correct paperwork is filled in. Please see Mrs. Clisham, Mrs. Fenney or Mrs. Tandy.

Please remember, absence leaves gaps in learning which are difficult to fill.

Our School Prospectus

The school prospectus has been updated in light of new staff appointments in school. General photographs illustrating school life are included and certain items remain bi-lingual in order to acknowledge our Welsh roots. Copies are available in school. The prospectus is reviewed annually.

Our School Budget

The school is allocated various sums of money through different formulas based on a number of variables including pupil numbers, floor area, age of the building, etc. Various grants are made available at different times of the year by the Welsh Assembly Government. These filter down to the school through the LEA. The school must work within the budget that is set by the LEA. The school has a separate account, The School Fund, into which all money coming into school is paid – uniform, trips, donations, swimming, etc. This is externally audited regularly and reported to the Governing Body.

How to apply for Nursery, Reception and High School.

Children will be admitted to school in accordance with our school admission policy, which caters for the needs of the local community and also those parents who wish for a religious environment for the education of their children. Parents are encouraged to visit the school to meet with staff and Head teacher and to find out about the school ethos.

Parents/carers apply for nursery places online using the Flintshire County Council Website. Application for nursery takes place in the February before entry (17th February 2023 for September 2023 start)

Parents/carers apply for reception places online using the Flintshire County Council Website. Forms for reception are available in the October of the child's nursery year. The closing date is towards the end of November (18.11.22 for September 2023 entry).

Forms for High School applications are available in the September of the child's Y5 year and the closing date is at the beginning of November (4.11.22 for September 2023 entry). At any other time during a child's school life, application for transfer may be made. This is done by filling in the form on the Local Authority's website.

How to apply for Early Entitlement Places.
